DOROTHY MACKENZIE (Independent Member: Chair of the Board; Chair of Search & Governance Committee)



Dorothy spent most of her professional career in the design industry working at the interface between brands, innovation and sustainability. She co-founded the London operations of Dragon Rouge, a global creative agency working with organisations from multinational companies to charities, small start-ups to professional bodies.

After a childhood in Scotland and an MA in PPE from Oxford she started her career in advertising, moving into the fast-growing

design world in the 80's. She was actively involved in the development of the design industry, sitting on the boards of the Design Business Association and the Design Council. She has sat on a number of public bodies, including the Government Advisory Committee on Business and the Environment, the National Advisory Group on Eco-Labelling, and Business in the Environment (part of Business in the Community). She was a member of the board of Green Alliance, including Chair from 2005 – 2010. She is currently a board member of Carbon Trust. She has also participated in several RSA committees.

Dorothy has written or contributed to a number of books on design, sustainability and brands including Green Design, Business is Beautiful, Longer Lasting Products and The Handbook of Design for Sustainability, reflecting her commitment to the essential role that creative skills must play in the transformation to a sustainable economy and way of living.

Dorothy lives in Cowes, Isle of Wight and in London.

PROFESSOR PAUL GOUGH (Principal and Vice-Chancellor)



Professor Paul Gough is Principal and Vice-Chancellor at Arts University Bournemouth, having moved from a role as Vice-President of RMIT University, Melbourne, Australia, and Chair of RMIT Europe. He was previously Deputy Vice-Chancellor at UWE, Bristol.

A painter, broadcaster and writer he has exhibited internationally and is represented in the permanent collection of the Imperial War

Museum, London, the Canadian War Museum, Ottawa, and the National War Memorial, New Zealand. In addition to leading roles in national and international higher education and global research assessment, his research into the imagery of war and peace has been presented to audiences throughout the world. As well as an exhibiting record he has published nine books, including monographs on the British painter Stanley Spencer, Paul and John Nash and several comprehensive studies of art from both world wars. His book on Gilbert Spencer will be published by Yale University Press in April 2024. Paul Gough worked in television for ten years and is currently writing his second book about the street artist, Banksy.

Professor Gough joined from RMIT University, based in Melbourne, where he was Pro-Vice

Chancellor and Vice-President of RMIT's College of Design and Social Context. He was also chair of the Board of RMIT Europe and RMIT Training. He was previously Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic) at UWE, Bristol; and prior to that, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Creative Arts, Design and Media. As an elected artist member and former chair of the board, he retains the title Royal West of England Academy Professor of Fine Arts. During his 6-year tenure at RMIT, Professor Gough led a major expansion of the College of Design and Social Context to over 26,000 students, and established major strategic collaborations across the creative industries, media and cultural sector and with public and private sector organisations across Australia and Asia. Whilst at UWE, he also held roles with the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) and HEFCE (including chairing the Research Assessment Exercise (RAE) sub-panel for Art and Design) and he led research assessment internationally both in Europe, New Zealand and Asia. He was chair of the 2014 RAE panel in Hong Kong.

A painter, broadcaster and writer, Professor Gough has exhibited internationally and is represented in the permanent collection of the Imperial War Museum, London, the Canadian War Museum, Ottawa, and the National War Memorial, New Zealand. His next exhibition will be held in Hong Kong and Singapore. His research interests lie in the iconography of commemoration, the cultural geographies of battlefields, and the representation of peace and conflict. Amongst his recent publications on war art and war artists is a monograph 'Journey to Burghclere' about the British artist Stanley Spencer (2006), A Terrible Beauty, an extensive study of British art of the Great War (2010), and 'Your Loving Friend', the edited correspondence between Desmond Chute and Stanley Spencer, published in 2011. A further study about Spencer's memorial chapel in Burghclere was published as 'The Holy Box' in collaboration with the National Trust in 2017. A book on the street artist Banksy - Banksy: A Bristol Legacy - was published in 2012, as part of a suite of talks, papers and media productions about the unknown artist. Gough has appeared on numerous TV and radio programmes in UK and overseas discussing the street artists, including a Tik Tok viral film that reached over 2 million viewers. Gough's book – 'Brothers in Arms' – about the post-war paintings, prints and drawings of Paul and John Nash was published in summer 2014 alongside a curated exhibition of the brother's paintings. Further publications, including over 50 peer-reviewed papers are on the AUB research repository, including 'Dead Ground: A Cultural Reading of Memoryscapes, 1914-1918' published in UK and Australia in 2019.

During ten years work as a television presenter, researcher and associate producer Paul worked for ITV, BBC and C4 on a range of creative arts programmes from dance to drama, poetry to painting, including the award-winning documentary Redundant Warrior, about the photographer Don McCullin, and 'Drawing Fire' a documentary on military sketching and panorama drawing.

Gough sits on the Board of the Dorset LEP; the BCP Cultural Compact, the Poole Museum Foundation Board, and is chair of UKADIA, the national board representing arts, media, design and drama school universities.

JAMES GRAY



James is a serial entrepreneur who has founded and run multiple companies over a 30 year career. James is the founder and CEO of Kortext, the UK's leading partner to universities delivering online educational resources to students at over 160 universities across the country and thousands more overseas, supporting online course delivery and improved learning experiences and engagement for students. Prior to Kortext, James was the founder and CEO of Coutts Information Services, a global supplier of services to university libraries

across the world and now a part of the Proquest / Clarivate organisation. On selling the Coutts business, James lived and worked in the US for 6 years setting up Amazon's eBook

store and working with Google, Microsoft, Barnes and Noble, Apple, and others on their eBook and content scanning and indexing initiatives.

James and family returned the UK in 2013 when he set up Kortext which now provides services into 2,500+ universities around the world in over 100 countries. James is also an investor and board member at a number of other, technology focused businesses and loves supporting innovative companies who are focused on redefining their sectors.

Kortext is based in Bournemouth and James lives in Poole with his family, enjoying time on the water, weather permitting!

Malcolm graduated from the University of St Andrews, going on to qualify as a Chartered Accountant with Price Waterhouse in London before moving into investment banking. There followed an MBA and a spell with his sponsor, a strategy firm in the USA. Malcolm went on to hold senior executive roles in global corporations before, in his early forties, he found his dream career: a portfolio of established NED roles running alongside hands-on participation in startups, always seeking variety of sectors and geographies. Serving today as chairman of two AIM companies, he is also

senior independent director with a large venture trust on the London Stock Exchange and trustee of the Royal Society for Public Health. When not in Dorset, Malcolm and his wife can usually be found in Malta. They have two adult sons.

Simon is a versatile leader with deep experience in strategy and transformation. JAMES JACKSON (Staff Governor)

James Jackson is Environment and Sustainability Manager within AUB Campus Services. He is responsible for AUB's strategic planning of environmental sustainability including net zero, through membership of Environment Committee and Net Zero Task Force. He is also a member of construction projects steering groups providing advice and support for new buildings or major refurbishments, advising on net zero or other sustainable framework activity. He has successfully implemented ISO14001:2015 / EcoCampus Platinum framework, Fairtrade certification, and obtained Salix Government funding for heat decarbonisation. He manages the day-to-day operations of environmental activities ensuring legal compliance and best practice for energy, travel, waste, biodiversity net gain, and net zero and is lead author of AUB's Sustainability and Net Zero programme of works that sets methodology and targets to 2030.
